Dear Parents & Carers,

As we approach the Easter holidays the Trust vision of 'Life, Love and Learning to the Full' has been clear for us all to see with children engaging in a whole range of memorable experiences and opportunities. Some of the highlights include the organisation of not one but two residential visits to London for our Year 5 children.

This is the first time in our history that we have managed to do this and it has been truly wonderful listening to the children share their experiences.

As a Trust we pride ourselves on the many partners we have locally and across the world. For many years our pupils have been working on projects with schools in Europe, India, Uganda and Kenya. This term our children have been engaging in curriculum activities with their peers in Mumbai & Mangalore in India. Along with this, pupils from Pilton Bluecoat have continued their British Council partnership work with five schools in Europe. The children of Witheridge, High Bickington and Beaford have also continued their partnership activities with a school in Berlin, Germany. Building a sense of community is something that we really value here at TEAM and something that we will continue to work on during the Summer Term.

As I write this we are busy making final preparations for the Proms 2023 event that will be held at the Queen's Theatre, Barnstaple. Last year Pilton Bluecoat and Pilton Infants' had their opportunity to perform at this historic venue. Once again for the first time ever all other TEAM schools will get the chance to perform. Tickets for both the afternoon and evening performance have sold out and I am really looking forward to seeing the children performing in front of a packed-out theatre. Once again, another lovely example of how the Trust strives to create memorable experiences for the children.

The experiences would not go ahead without amazing staff members who are willing to get involved with the organisation of these things. Many hours are spent organising transport, filling out risk assessments and booking venues and events. Ensuring the children are kept safe and have an enjoyable time is a priority in all of our schools and we are blessed that we have experienced staff members who are willing to give up additional hours/days of their time to ensure that this happens. These things would also not occur without your continued support. Working in partnership with parents and carers is something that we really value at TEAM Multi-Academy Trust. As I visit our schools it is clear to see when speaking to school leaders and staff just how much your encouragement and positivity is valued.

Finally, I would like to finish with the children. I am very fortunate in my position to be able to visit all six of our schools on a regular basis. Spending time talking to children and gathering their views about their experiences is a real privilege and one that I value very much. It is really clear to us all here at TEAM Multi-Academy Trust that the pupils in our care have experienced a very challenging time over the past few years. As I cast my mind back to when Covid-19 first hit the country residential trips to London, performing in the Queen's Theatre and children collaborating through sport and the arts seemed like a very long way off indeed. Seeing children taking part in these things again is exciting and something that I know as a Trust we must continue to provide.

As we approach the Summer Term we are all looking forward to brighter days, sunny weather and plenty of outdoor learning. I am very much looking forward to writing to you again in July with more examples of how 'Life, Love and Learning to the Full,' has been evident across the Multi-Academy Trust.

My experience as a Head of School, teacher trainer and school support adviser will help connect to each school's ambitions and support them to find the next step in their development.

The day-to-day job will include visiting schools to assess their progress, engaging with research organisations to make sure we are taking the right approach in the classroom, and looking for opportunities to bring teachers from across the Trust together, when they have similar aims.

Ultimately, all children in all settings deserve a superlative education. My role is to ensure this is delivered in every corner of the Trust, which is why as a trust grows larger, it is critical that I am wholly dedicated to finding these opportunities to improve".
