As the academic year closes, I find myself reflecting on everything that has been achieved across TEAM Multi-Academy Trust during the academic year 2022/23. So many highlights come to mind and it has been particularly pleasing to see that we have continued to provide the children with a range of collaborative opportunities to engage.



in. We managed to organise a variety of school trips across all year groups and residential experiences for our Key Stage Two children. This year we also arranged not one but two London residential visits ensuring each time that Year 5 children from around the Trust had the chance to learn more about our capital city. The Proms event held at the Queen's Theatre was organised this year for the schools that did not participate during the academic year 2021/22. Once again, this event proved to be amazing and showcased the talent we have across the trust. For the past three years, our schools have been involved with the 'Voice to Tell Our Story' Project which was organised by Beaford Arts and the University of South Wales. This involved our children gaining access to a professional artist, storyteller, film maker and photographer. The children thoroughly enjoyed their interactions with the team, and everyone really benefited from being involved. Along with these highlights, we have continued to ensure that a range of sporting, music, art and humanities events have taken place. Our children have also taken part in a variety of workshops. Two that really stood out were with London-based artist Sophia Amelia Creates and the archaeology workshop with Durham University. These things would of course not have happened without such a committed staff team who get everything organised and of course through your support.

Our international work with schools in India and across Europe has continued. It has been particularly rewarding observing children in our schools sharing ideas and learning with their peers from other countries. This is something that we will be continuing with during 2023/24.

Thanks to those of you that took the time to complete the parent survey. Your feedback as always is very much appreciated. Along with this, we always gather the views of our pupils and staff. As we progress over the next few weeks, we will be completing a detailed analysis of the data to see where we can continue to make improvements in each individual school and collectively as a Multi-Academy Trust.

As we approach the holidays, it is clear to establish that schools across the country are still facing many challenges created by the pandemic, cost of living crisis and political upheaval. Research is showing that issues linked to school finance, vulnerable children, pupil behaviour and attendance are common themes in both primary and secondary settings. These will continue to be areas of focus for us next year.

As the school year ends, I am conscious that it is a time of transition to new year groups and new schools. Our Year 6 cohorts across the Trust have been fantastic this year and I would like to take this opportunity to wish them all the very best for the future.

The staff, as always deserve a huge thank you for all the hard work, time and expertise that they have brought to their schools and TEAM MAT as a whole. It is clear to see as I complete my visits just how much they have enjoyed working with such amazing children.

In conclusion, on behalf of the Trustees, Local Governors and Staff I would like to take this opportunity to thank you for your continued support and to wish you all the very best for the future.




Teachers Rock Music Festival @ The Big sheep

SPOTLIGHT ON STAFF

TEAM Multi-Academy Trust's Cook | Bobbie Leach | Representing Witheridge C of E Academy



"I have worked at Witheridge school for 22 years now as a kitchen manager. I have seen many changes over the years and survived the turkey twizzlers epidemic. I have watched the children's eating habits change over the years, not always for the better, but I do love spending time encouraging the children to try new things and I like to think I have made a positive difference to a lot of children over the years. Living in a village, I like to see the children outside of school and how they see me. They cannot believe I have a life outside the school. One child saw me in my garden and asked what I was doing there. I told them I lived there, and they did not believe me because I live in the school kitchen. I like to see the children go on to secondary school and grow into adults, then have their own family who I go on to look after at lunchtimes in school.

My worst memory of my time at Witheridge school will always be the time I had 1 yoghurt left in a bowl and a little boy asked me if he could have it. I said yes, he could but as it is my only yoghurt, I expect him to not waste it as a lot of children would like to have it. He promised to eat it all and off he went. He did not eat it, so I asked him to sit back down and eat half of it for me. It took him a while to eat it, but we compromised, and he ate some of it. Only for me to find out it was not a pot of yogurt but a pot of salad cream. I am sure he remembers his primary school dinner lady well.

I live with my family, Steve, my long-suffering husband of 28years, Jamie who is 26, Bradley who is 24 and Melissa who is 15. Along with a string of animals, comprising of horses, goats, dogs, rabbits, and a cat. With my busy family home, I do not have much spare time for hobbies except riding horses and walking dogs, beach trips being a favorite".

- Q. Summer or Winter? A. I do love the summer months, evenings on the beach with the evening sun with fish and chips but I also like the fire on, doors locked, and the curtains drawn to keep the cold out in winter.
- Q. Night In or Night Out? A. Anyone that knows me knows that I am a night in person. One late night will take me a week to get over. Cup of tea in bed for the news at 10.
